


ARRR-SQUARED

As you may know, pirates are statistically correlated with global warming. See the graph below, which has shown up in places as varied as Forbes.com and the Church of the Flying Spaghetti Monster (feel free to look it up, but it won't give you any puzzle relevant information). We found some other piratical correlations, but we think they may be spurious. Maybe you can find better pairings (which may have nothing to do with whether they are presented as solid or dotted lines) as well as their point of intersection, year by year, to get an answer

Note: The bold italic part of each variable can be solved as a cryptic clue (see handout). Unlike most cryptic clues, these only have wordplay. The straight definition for each clue is "name." You may find that these names have something in common.

Need help with the clues? The numbers in black circles refer to specific clue types listed on the Cryptic Clues Primer reference sheet you received.

Much better—now those dumb pirate clues those Az-holes wrote match our theme and all of the original clue text is just flavor. Even better, all of the answers are in alphabetical order!—P









AW, SHIPS!

We've been gathering information about a small pirate fleet guarding a very impressive collection of treasures. We've stolen a grid of letters and numbers (below), as well as two cards (attached), that supposedly tell us how they deploy their fleet. Here's what we know:

1. They have ten ships in four different sizes, as depicted below.
2. Each card encodes a different deployment of this fleet to the same area, by somehow telling us how many ship segments are in each row and column.
3. Each ship has one or more pennants that it flies no matter where it's deployed. These pennants are shown on the ships below.
4. Within one deployment, no two ships will ever be adjacent to each other, even diagonally.

If you can figure out these two fleet deployments, we may be able to find their hidden treasures by seeing which sites they make sure are guarded.
