

FINAL EXAM

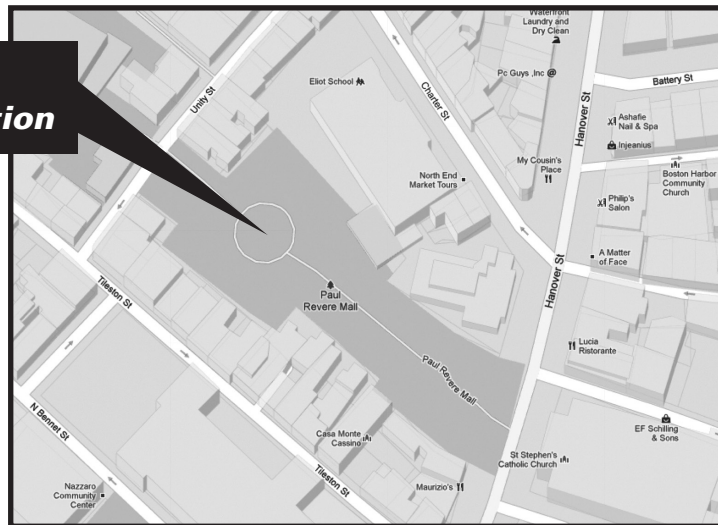
Your final exam requires you to relate what you've learned about each famous person with things in your immediate environment. You are not required to show your work. However, should you choose to do so, you may find the table on the next page useful.

First, revisit each initial reading and identify the key theme of the reading. Then find a similar theme in your immediate environment. You may find it easier to take pictures and work from those so not all students are crowded together in the same place.

Each famous person has a vehicle; you should be able to figure out how far each vehicle travels. Go that far from the theme you just discovered in your environment. You'll need to use trial and error to determine whether to go up or down, and bear in mind that every line is important, whether it contains numbers, letters, or symbols.

Finally, use the new information that you learned about that person to match patterns and look for similarities in your new location.
